MEETING REPORT

- **Show.** A request for funding up to \$2500 was approved. Jean Crabtree spoke about the kitchen roster and asked Groups to discuss and provide a list of helpers.

-Drum Sander. The Committee approved the purchase of a sleeveless drom sander from for around \$120. This is used in a drill press.

PEMONSTRATION

This was organised by the Carving Group. The demonstrator/speaker was Thomas Hansen a carver and artist from Pahoia. Thomas talked us through a power point presentation of his history and development. He travelled extensively through Europe learning his craft where he was introduced to carving on bone and whale tooth. Known as Scrimshaw work. Such was his skill at this he spent a year working for a person who had a large collection of whales teeth. His photos of these show how adept he is at this. Thomas is a renowned Maori carver and is a member of a select group of Maori carvers that undertake a community project each year. He show a photo of a recently completed project carving the story in a meeting house facade.

Thomas accepted a commission to carve a walking stick for a prominent person. His

preparation was 15 written pages of that persons history before he started carving that into the walking stick. From the photo it was very intricate and magnificent.

He is an accomplished artist and the photos he displayed showed absolutely unbelievable detail and talent.

Thomas is of Danish heritage and is red/green colour blind.

Show and Tell. Thank you to Grant Parker for a great job in doing the Show & Tell for us. Asking the crafters who made the items to describe their creations, finish etc. got them involved and is excellent information for helping others. The display this month was boosted by Group 4 wood turners monthly project. A monthly project at Group 4 is a new innovation and the May project was a platter. Hopefully we will see more of these projects appearing on the Guild's monthly display table.

SAFETY WITH THE LATHE

The Lathe is different from any of the other woodworking machines in our workshop. It is the only one which does not have vicious teeth or blades, rushing towards you at a rate of thousands per second.

There is only one sharp tooth and it is on the end of the tool which is held in your hand and safely facing away from you.

But don't be complacent, the lathe has other ways of inflicting pain and injury.

Did You Notice?

This is issue number 300 of our Newsletter. Surely another milestone for the Guild.

1. HOLDING WOOD

Make sure your piece of wood is securely fixed in the Lathe

a. Spindle Turning:

The wood is fixed "Between Centres" At the Headstock end with a Spur Drive or in the Chuck and at the Tailstock end with a Live Centre

b. Faceplate Turning:

- Bowls or Plates are held with one of the following: Woodworm Screw Face-plate or Face-plate Ring The Chuck
- 2. **THE TOOLREST** This should be positioned as close to the workpiece as practical.

BEFORE STARTING THE LATHE - MAKE SURE EVERYTHING IS TIGHT

Tool Slide, Tool-rest, Chuck, Tailstock

- SPEED Always start at a slow speed with a rough piece. Once it is round and balanced, you can move the toolrest in closer and increase the speed.
- 4. EYES Wear Safety Glasses or Mask
- 5. NOSE/LUNGS Use Dust Mask when Sanding
- 6. **HAIR** If you have long hair, make sure that it is tied back and can't get caught in the machine.
- FARS Listen for any rattle, clatter or any change of sound. If you hear something, or you have a "Dig-in", stop the lathe and check what has come loose. (The lathe is not a noisy machine so ear protection is not needed.)
- 8. **CLOTHING** Avoid loose sleeves or anything that can wrap around the machine. Wear closed shoes in case you drop a tool or something.
- 9. SHARP TOOLS A sharp tool cuts easily and is less likely to cause a dig-in.
