THE PRESIDENT'S PAPERS

Presidents Annual Report for year ending 31st March 2018:

There have been several issues of note during the year with all but one ending with a positive result. **Police Vetting.** Required because we are teaching woodworking skills to children under 18 years of age through the Home Schools and Family Works programs. The Tauranga Woodcrafters Guild is now a registered Police Vetting Agency and all tutor vetting applications must be submitted through the Guild. **Building Warrant of Fitness.** The testing and inspection procedures have now been established with the alarm systems tested monthly and an authorised agency completing the annual inspection and obtaining the Warrant of Fitness.

Performance Reporting. This is as required by the Charities Commission / Dept. of Internal Affairs. This was a complex issue that was raised when applying for funding through the Community Organisation Grants Scheme. Defining the requirements was involved and complex and required interpreting a number of bureaucratic issues.

Scroll Saw Workshop 2017. This has been held annually for several years and was again very successful and well patronised with in excess of 20 participants covering beginner scroll saw workers, intarsia and marquetry. My congratulations to the organisers.

Annual Show / Exhibition. Regretfully this had to be cancelled unfortunately with a financial loss. **Fund Raising.** A number of BBQ's were very successful and contributed to our showing a small profit for the year. Thank-you to those that organised and participated in these.

Tutoring School Groups. The tutoring of these groups has been very successful and popular and I congratulate the dedicated tutors.

Lion Foundation Grant. Our thanks to the Foundation for a Grant of \$8,000. This has enabled us to proceed with the purchase of new machinery and equipment and to upgrade existing machinery. This is presently being received and installed.

Lottery Grant. A complex and lengthy procedure was necessary in completing this application. The application was to cover operational expenses for the 2018/19 financial year. We grateful received \$8,300. **Group Leaders.** The Group Leaders have done a fantastic job over the year. I congratulate and thank them for the job they have done and their willingness. Also other volunteers e.g. Librarian, Caretaker, Wood Officer, BBQ Organiser and any I may have missed. Thank you for your contributions.

MEETING REPORT

AGM: The Guild's AGM was held on May12th. Unfortunately the turnout was disappointing with only 25 members physically present.

Guild Membership Fees for 2018/19: The AGM passed a resolution to hold membership fees at the same level as in 2017/18. Namely:

Group Reports: These are included in the newsletter. Librarian : Merv Griffin has said he would like to stand down from this role. If anyone interested to take over as our Librarian please contact George Yardley. Members Welfare: Currently we have a number of members who are unwell, have had accidents, or operations are planned. These include: Duncan Campbell, Jim Reilly, Jim Dekker, Harry Bimler, Carole Knowles, and Mike McCarthy. Our best wishes go out to them all for a speedy recovery. Housekeeping Reminder: When you depart the Guild rooms, please ensure all lights have been

turned off, windows are closed, equipment unplugged, hazards like the Table saw blade is wound down, and cups are washed.

Workshop Layout: In conjunction with the arrival of new equipment the committee is seeking member feedback on the question of better utilising space within the Guild rooms. A prototype scroll saw table has been built by Mike Buck for members to review and provide feedback.

2018 Show - Guild Members Showcase & Exhibition

Frazer Pengelly has agreed to coordinate the 2018 Members Exhibition & Showcase of Guild Member's wood working skills.

We want ALL members to contribute at least ONE (1) and a maximum of THREE (3) items of your work for display in our Exhibition.

- Entry is restricted to members of the Tauranga Woodcrafters Guild.
- Categories: Turning; Carving; Scroll saw (including) Intarsia & Marquetry; Toys; & Open.
- No time restriction work can be items you made this year, or sometime in the past.
- It must be work you are proud to show off to your peers and to the public.
- Items should not have been competition entries elsewhere, at any time.
- Exhibition Entries may be displayed by you as being for sale, or not for sale.
- Note Members can pay for a Stall to sell work the Exhibition is to Showcase the best of your skills.
- If they are being sold, the buyer will not be able to remove them until the 2018 Show ends.
- Exhibition items judged by a professional Terry Scott and prizes will be awarded.
- The Show Organisers in consultation with the Guild Committee reserves the right to decline an entry.

Our current plan is that the Exhibition will be on the mezzanine in the Hall on table displays. We will have Exhibition area "Floor walkers" to provide security and interaction with the general public.

PEMONSTRATION

The AGM took place and there was no demonstration at the May monthly meeting. However, there were three items on display on the "show & tell" table and as a change the creators were asked to provide comments on their own work.

Mike Buck who has only been turning for 6 months displayed a finial item where the idea came from the Pinterest site. Mike wanted to make his piece using NZ woods & selected spalted Rewa Rewa, Totara Burr and Kahikatea (a tree which once dominated the forests covering much of New Zealand's swampy lowland). After making the piece Mike wanted a way to display it and

has elected to combine the work with a metallic spiral formed from a bronzing rod.

Roy Tregilgas likewise had made a finial item - a bird house design. The design idea came from a Wood Turning magazine. Roy made the body of the bird house from Tanekaha which is a slow-growing evergreen conifer endemic to New Zealand. The common name for the tree - 'Celery Pine' - comes from the celery-like foliage. Roy used the lathe to hollow the inside of the house and the a Dremel tool to create the patterning.

Jim Dekker discussed the beautiful grain in the piece of Kauri used to create his turned bowl. He also told the group the history of the block of wood in terms of his buying the timber at a May show in Palmerston North several years ago. The finding and then using a raw block of wood to

reveal its' hidden beauty is one of the pleasures of wood working.
