Monthly meeting

The Turning Group were on duty this month and we had a presentation by Laurie Young, who showed us various pieces that he had made over the years when he was a member of Whangarei Wood Turners, which also covered carving on turning. His presentation was well received by those who attended.

At the main meeting Lawson Worsnop demonstrated the new Chinese Chansen lathe that is available from Vince at the *Machinery and Power Tool Centre*. It is a midi lathe with electronic controls and 1hp motor. It was very nicely machined from cast iron, so is solid and free running with no vibration and a top speed of 3760 rpm! Quite a few members were pleasantly surprised at how the lathe performed.

The whole package costs \$2700.00, which includes the lathe, all accessories and 5 jaw option scroll chuck, plus a 4 pack carbide chisel set.





Group Activities

Group 1: Woodcarvers

2nd and 4th Monday of the month. 9:30am – 3:00pm.

The carvers have recently welcomed Linda Hawkins as a new member of our group.

The Carvers had a very busy day for our first meeting in April. The professional carver - Rex Homan - had agreed to come and speak with the group about his decoration techniques using paint and ink designs on wood.

Rex is a top NZ sculptural wood carver and he was the 2019 recipient of the Supreme Award at the 2019 Te Waka Toi Awards - joining NZ artists such as Kiri Te Kanawa in receiving such recognition. Rex works mostly in Kauri producing contemporary Maori inspired designs. He has introduced the use of colour with his carvings, which are mostly sold into the lucrative North American Market. When the carving is complete he sands the piece down through the various grits going down to 320 grit. At this point he has the carving ready for his design, which is applied directly onto the bare wood.

Where he wants vibrancy on a carving, such as with a Tui's feathers, he uses Automotive lacquer paints (Dupli-Color). Where he wants to add areas of texture and patterns onto a covering, such as a contemporary Maori motif, he draws the motif design directly onto the wood with Artline water based drawing pens. He then applies a dilute wash of Liquitex water based ink on top of the pattern. The result is that the pattern shows through the ink.

Rex's only method of finishing the work is to apply several (up to 5) coats of Briwax. In his opinion, this gives his work the longest lasting finish.

This fund raiser by the carving group has earned the Guild \$1,800.

Group Five: Scroll Saw, Marquetry and Intarsia

1st and 3rd Wednesdays at 9.30am

The task for the Group this month has been the staging of the 11th Annual Hands-on Scrollsaw Workshop, an event aimed at sharing the Guild's knowledge and skills nationally, with now only four NAW North Island Clubs not having attended our Workshops.

This year 14 people attended from 11 different Clubs, including one from Christchurch. Within the 14 were 5 beginners and 3 experienced with regular attendees working on special high level projects tailored for them by Jacob. Intarsia instruction was the most popular choice, while the beginners were supplied with kitsets that exposed them to a range of disciplines. Ten Scroll Group members covered kitchen, registration and tutoring duties. A display of work completed by Group members impressed the student attendees due to quality and variety of the work. The event generated a healthy surplus for Guild funds.







On Wednesday the 21st we had a visit from three members of the Cambridge Wood Turners Club who were interested to see the range of work that could be done with a scrollsaw. In the words of Barry Harding from the Cambridge group, "We learnt so much and felt humbled by the friendliness of everyone in the group, your club members are to be congratulated on showing the way how a club should interact with other fellow clubs." They are keen to further this relationship between our clubs.
