THE PRESIDENT'S PAPERS

Members Welfare: To all those members who are unwell, or are recovering from illness, our thoughts are with you and we all wish you a speedy recovery.

Guild AGM News: Our AGM was held on May 15th with the election of a new committee for 2021/22. Barwick Harding stood down from the committee at the AGM.

At the AGM our members in attendance voted in the following committee for 2021/22: Phil Hansen (President); Greg Taylor (Vice President); Margaret Dekker (Treasurer); Alan Sciascia (Secretary); Allan Curtis (Newsletter Editor); Jake Stemmer (Open Workshop Coord.); Lawson Worsnop (Turning Group Coord.); Glenn Whittaker (Scrollsaw Group Coord.); and Frazer Pengelly (Carving Group Coord.).

Many of you have volunteered your help willingly during 2020/21. We record here our sincere vote of thanks and appreciation for all the hard work, efforts and every contribution made by members on behalf of the Tauranga Woodcrafters Guild. We rely on volunteers. Thank you all very much indeed.

Margaret Dekker gave the Treasurers's report where the key aspect covered the fall in Guild's income arising from the Covid virus situation during 2020 & 2021. Our income has dropped by \$4,000. The key reasons were that we did not have a Scrollsaw workshop in 2020, we had to stop the sausage sizzles at Bunnings, we put a hold on the Home school program and stopped the Social welfare Family Works school program and therefore lost the income from all of these sources.

On the expenses side we were also faced with some higher one-off expenses when a motor failed on a bandsaw and had to be replaced, fluorescent lights failed and had to be replaced with new LED lights in the lunch room area, and there were electrical problems with a lathe VSD and a scrollsaw drive. Our expense costs rose compared with earlier years because of these items. Nevertheless we were pleased to report that the Guild still managed a small profit for the year ending 31st March 2021.

The Guild members at the AGM voted to leave membership subscriptions unchanged.

2021 / 2022 Subscriptions: Thanks to all members who have already paid your 2021 / 22 subscriptions. Currently 55 people have paid out of our normal adult membership of approximately 85 people. I just want to remind everyone else that these are now due for payment. If you are a full adult member and you pay on, or before 30th June, your Membership Fee is \$70.00. If you pay after 1st July, your Membership Fee is \$75.00. If you are a member of NAW and state your NAW membership number on the Application for Membership Form you may discount your membership renewal payment by \$10.

2021 Show: The dates for the 2021 Show at the Mount Sports Centre are November 19th, 20th and 21st. It is our intention to increase the stall holder fees for members to \$50 this year. This is to cover the cost of members having stall at the show. The fee is the same whether the stall is for one, two or three days. We will start at 10am each day and close at 4pm on Friday and Saturday but will finish at 1pm on Sunday 21st. We are seeking donations of an item of work from each group for the Guild's raffle. We also request all groups to start thinking about pieces of work which will be included in the exhibition area of members work.
