

# **Guild monthly meeting**

Garry Webber and Lance Gray shared their expertise about greenstone (pounamu) carving. Both keen rock hounds, Lance and Garry teamed up some years ago to go on fossiking expeditions. Garry described himself as a chain saw man using the stone with wood. Both see similarities between working with stone and wood. Their main tools are grinders to get an initial shape and sanders. A pendant can be made in a day with modern tools compared to the years traditional Māori carvers needed to sand using abrasive stone. Lance, who learnt his craft on the Arahura River on the West Coast, uses his carving skills to create detailed pendants.

Greenstone/pounamu/New Zealand jade which is highly valued, and a taonga for Māori, is a type of nephrite found in many parts of the world. There are four main kinds: kawakawa, kahurangi, īnanga and tangiwai. Jadeite is rarer and the highest quality is found in Myanmar.




#### **Carvers' Group**

Recently, the group visited local woodcarver Kevin McCardle's workshop and were treated to a very interesting overview of his latest sculptural carving work. He told us he is now using treated pine for much of his outdoor pieces.

#### Handy tip from Kerin:

To carve one of Kevin's seagulls looking sideways, begin by cutting it out with the head and body aligned in the same plane. Then to get the head angled to one side, cut off the bird's head from the neck, turn it slightly to one side, and glue the head back to the neck. Finish by reshaping the neck at the join line. A simple and effective way to create the shape without wasting wood. Geoff Brann and Lance Gray have both been busy working on the carving for the Omokoroa Library.




